It's not too late to apply for a Challenge Award in 2017!

Applications for the Challenge Award, which require a three- to five-page Organizational Profile and Key Business Factors Worksheet, are due **July 1.** An Organizational Profile sets the context for understanding your organization; helps identify gaps in key information and focus on key performance requirements and results; and identify topics for which conflicting, little or no information is available to use for strategic planning.* The process of writing a Challenge award application can enhance accreditation processes such as the ISO 9001:2015 with a defined framework for creating an Organization Context.

As a Challenge applicant, you will receive a feedback report on your Profile and award recognition at the Governor's Quality Award Celebration in September at the Marriott Hotel in Little Rock. Training is available by webinar for those writing a Challenge Award.

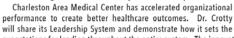

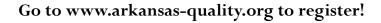
Dr. Chad Rodgers
